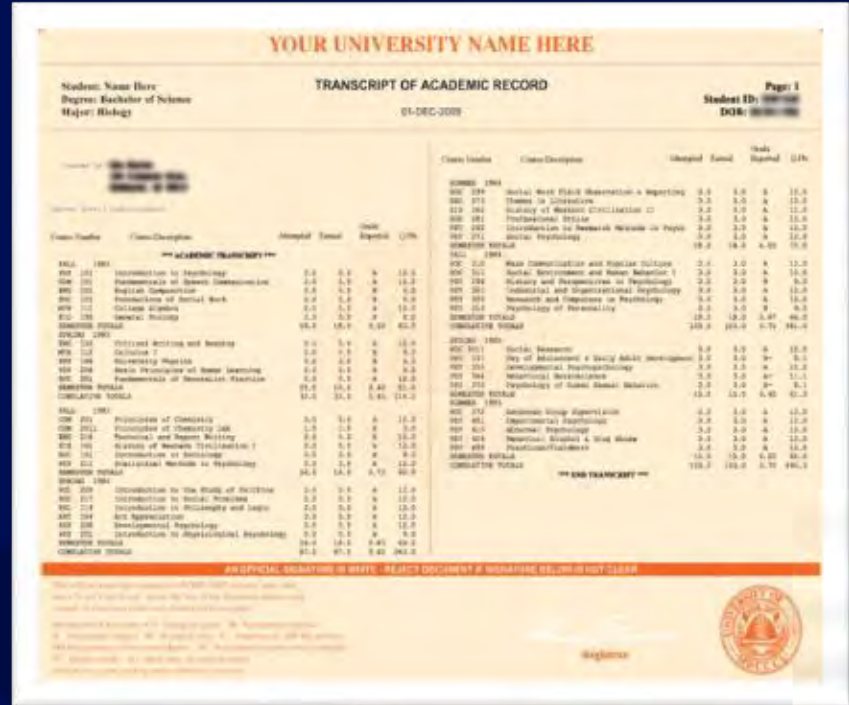

# How do I get my Syracuse University transcript, and when should I order it?

*Timing and sequence matter more than students typically expect*

*Ordering before a grade is posted results in a blank transcript; a common and entirely preventable mistake.*



## Spring 2026 Registration Calendar

Please pay close attention to Syracuse University Project Advance deadlines. Syracuse University prohibits retroactive registration for SU courses after the registration deadline has passed.

# Step 1 — Activate NetID & Confirm Grade in MySlice

*Before you can order, you need to confirm your grade is posted*

## Activate your NetID

**A** Go to [netid.syr.edu](https://netid.syr.edu) using your SUID number. Your SUID is on your welcome letter or the invoice mailed to your parent/guardian.

## Sign into MySlice

**B** Go to [myslice.syr.edu](https://myslice.syr.edu) — enter your NetID + @syr.edu (e.g. JSmith@syr.edu). MFA setup is required for all logins.

## Confirm grade is posted

**C** Go to Student Home → Academics → Grades. Look for a letter grade to the right of the course.

*Do NOT proceed to Step 2 until a letter grade appears*

## Step 2 — Order Through Parchment

### Create a new account

Parchment has recently upgraded their system — all students must create a new account.

### Enter Program: "Project Advance"

Use your full formal name (e.g. "James" not "Jim") and date of birth when setting up.

### Have your SUID ready

OR last 4 digits of SSN. Call 315-443-2404 if needed — SUPA will NOT provide SUID over email or livechat.

### Know the destination address

Contact your college for the correct mailing or email address before starting. Fee: \$12.

### Verify receipt after sending

5

Follow up with the receiving office to confirm the transcript arrived. Don't assume it did.

**Common mistakes to prevent:** Ordering before grade posting · Sending to the wrong address · Confusing SU transcript with high school transcript · Using mobile on Parchment · Missing the receiving institution's deadline

## Transcripts & Credit Transfer



If you officially registered for your SU course through Project Advance you are eligible to request an SU transcript and attempt to have your credits transferred. While Project Advance cannot guarantee that your credits will be accepted by another college or university, 90% of our former students report receiving credit recognition of some kind. ### Ordering Your Syracuse University Transcript

Syracuse University partners with Parchment to order and deliver official university transcripts.

**\*FORMER STUDENTS: if you are not currently enrolled in a SU course, skip to Step 2. If you are currently enrolled in an SU course, proceed with Step 1**

1. Confirm that your grade has been posted by your high school instructor after completion of the course. **If you do not wait until your grade is officially posted, your transcript will be blank.**

We recommend that students wait to order their official transcript until after their grade has been posted. We will alert students when this has occurred via email. The student may also log in to view/confirm their grade has been posted.

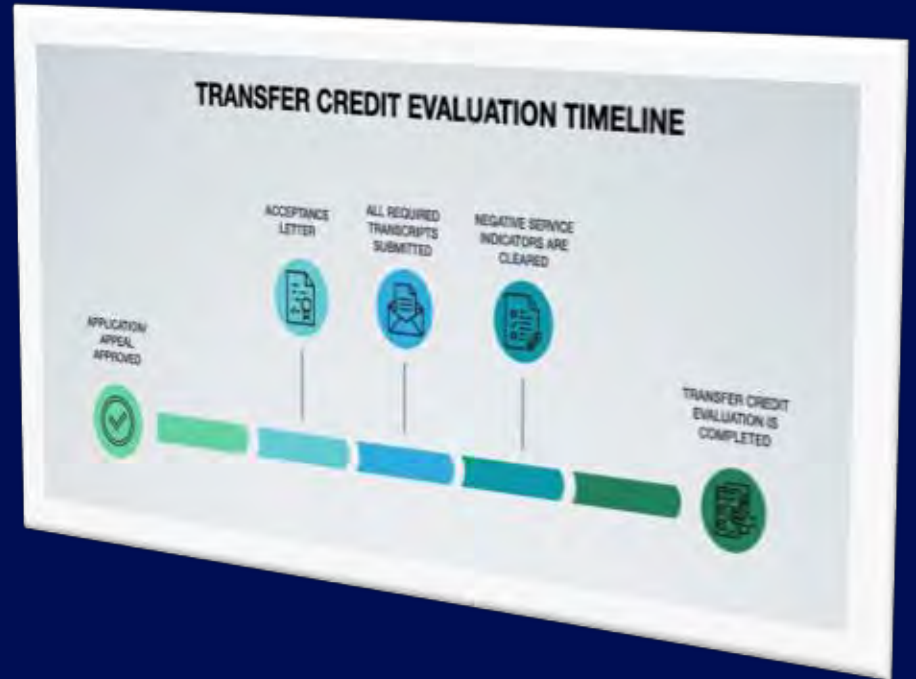

## Why might a college not recognize dual enrollment credits?

A college may consider timing, location, course rigor, method of delivery, and department requirements when evaluating credit transfer and recognition

*Understanding the structural reasons helps students and families respond constructively rather than personally.*

# Common Reasons Why Dual Enrollment Credits Aren't Recognized

### A Location-based policy

Courses taught on a high school campus by a high school instructor are questioned at some institutions; regardless of rigor.

\*SUPA instructors are Syracuse University adjunct faculty.

### B "Double-dipping"

Some universities prohibit using a course for both high school graduation and college credit. Northwestern and Yale both state this explicitly (as of 2026).

### C Institutional type

Ivy League and some selective privates don't like to accept transfer credits. Some have caps on the number of credits. Always reach out to make a transfer request; even if you think it is unlikely.

### D Other requirements

Universities require minimum credits completed on campus before a degree is awarded — capping how much dual enrollment credit can count. Brandeis caps at 16 credits; many schools cap at 60–64.

**Key framing for students:** A denial does not mean the course was not rigorous or valuable. It means the receiving institution has a policy category that requires further appeal. The learning and skills gained are real, and often still recognized in admissions and placement.

## How do credit transfer policies vary, and how can students find out in advance?



*Proactive research before enrollment is the single best protective strategy*

## Save It · Say It · Prove It

*The three-part framework for securing credit recognition*

### Public in-state

*Generally favorable*

### Private colleges

*Variable*

### Ivy / elite private

*Rarely accept*

#### SAVE IT

Keep your syllabus, written work, exams, and portfolios. Colleges may request these to verify course comparability and determine placement or exemption.

#### SAY IT

Indicate on college applications that you took Syracuse University courses — not "Project Advance courses." There is no such thing as a Project Advance course. Use the course name and number.

#### PROVE IT

After receiving email notification that your grade is posted, request an official Syracuse University transcript be sent to the appropriate contact. Do not begin credit transfer petitions before the transcript has been sent.

## Recommended Research Practices

*How to find out what a school will accept; before committing*

**1 Start with published policy**  
Most colleges post transfer credit policies on their registrar's or admissions website. Look for specific language about **dual enrollment** or "high school college courses."

**2 Contact admissions and advisors directly**  
Published policies may not cover every scenario. A direct email citing the specific course name and number often yields a more accurate answer. Contact our SUPA office for more information or assistance.

**3 Ask major-specific questions**  
A course may transfer as **elective credit** but not fulfill a **major requirement**. Students should ask whether credit counts toward their intended program — not just toward the degree generally.

**4 Research before committing to a school**  
Don't wait until the last minute! Research during junior or early senior year, while schools are still competing for students. Look for **transfer credit tools, equivalency tables**, or FAQs on the target institution's website.

*Instructors: encourage students to view credit transfer research as an integral part of their college search. If the initial research does not yield promising results, advise the student to submit a petition or request an admissions representative to review the credit.*

# Other Institutions of Higher Education & Third Parties\*



### Transfer Credit

Rules as of 5/19/2026 3:58:54 PM

Continuing students who wish to take courses at another institution and transfer the credit to Northeastern must obtain prior (and documented) approval from their college academic advisor.

#### Transfer Credit Policies

1. Credits earned at another accredited institution must be submitted on an official transcript from that institution.
2. A maximum of 60 credits from two-year and 80 credits from four-year accredited institutions, or 80 credits from a combination of the two, may be accepted toward a Northeastern degree.
3. Only those academic credit courses that carry a grade of "C" or higher can be accepted.
4. Remedial/developmental/ESL/physical education/military courses are not transferable.
5. When a course has been repeated at another school or schools, only the most recent course will be eligible for transfer.
6. Credit for transferable courses will be granted on a semester basis according to translation standards and in accordance with AACRAO guidelines and procedures.
7. Liberal arts courses taken more than 10 years ago will not be considered for transfer credit. Math and science courses taken more than 5 years ago will not be considered for transfer credit.
8. Students have up to one semester after matriculation to reconcile transfer credit.
9. Courses that do not appear in the database have not been reviewed by a faculty member. Now course evaluations are only completed for admitted students. A full syllabus must be submitted for evaluation.
10. Evaluations in this database should be used as a guide and are subject to change.

## Course Equivalencies

Course equivalencies are tables of courses that are transferable among institutions. In order to receive credit at your SUNY transfer campus for a course completed at another institution, that course must first be determined to be "equivalent" to a course offered at your SUNY transfer campus. Final determination of transfer credit acceptance is ultimately made by the campus registrar. You must submit official transcripts of all completed coursework before a final determination can be made.

## What can a student do if credit is denied; is "no" really the final answer?

*No is often the beginning of a conversation, not the end*

*Many institutions have petition or placement processes specifically designed for cases with dual enrollment coursework.*

## The Advocacy Toolkit

*Five steps to pursue recognition after an initial denial*

1

### Get the denial in writing

Ask for the specific reason. "We don't accept dual enrollment" vs. "the course doesn't meet department requirements" require very different responses.

2

### Find the right person

Admissions reps usually lack authority to make credit decisions. Registrars administer policy. The department chairperson relevant to your course is most likely to have real authority.

3

### Use the syllabus as evidence

The SU syllabus — authored by a SU faculty member, meeting on-campus standards — is the strongest documentation of rigor. Bring written work and portfolios too.

4

### Refer to it correctly

Always call it a "Syracuse University course" instead of a "Project Advance course." Use the official course name and number in all communications (i.e., MAT 295).

### Contact SUPA for support

Provide the following information when contacting us; course name, year, instructor, target institution, and a summary of communications with dates.



Instructors: Keep older sections of syllabi, and update syllabi each year in PASS.

**Bottom line:** Persistence pays off. "No" from a front-desk admissions staffer is not the same as "no" from a department chair.

## Value Beyond Credit Transfer

*What to say when students ask, "was it worth it?"*

### Placement

Eligible to take a higher-level course  
— skipping introductory sequences.

### Course exemption

Fulfills a general education, major, or  
minor requirement.

### Credit recognition

Credits added as direct equivalency or  
elective credit.

### WHAT TO SAY TO STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

- The primary objective of SUPA is to acquire knowledge, skills, and gain practical experience at the college level.
- Even if credit does not transfer, the course appears on a verified SU transcript; a permanent academic credential.
- Placement and exemption often deliver equivalent time and cost savings as direct credit transfer.
- Students who consistently complete SUPA/Dual Enrollment courses demonstrate strong college readiness and gain an advantage during the college admissions process.

## **Definitions and terms: Referenced in Action Guide**

**Dual/Concurrent Enrollment**: A program in which a college-approved high school instructor teaches a college course at the high school campus. SUPA is a concurrent enrollment program.

**Credit Recognition**: A qualitative acknowledgment of coursework that signals academic rigor; may influence admissions review, placement, or advancement in a degree pathway without awarding formal credit hours.

**Credit Transfer**: The formal awarding of credit hours by a receiving institution that apply toward a degree program. (e.g., 3 credit hours of elective credit or toward a math requirement.)

**General Education Requirements**: When a course is applied toward a student's general education/core requirements or toward a general degree.

**Graduation Requirements**: When a course is applied toward a student's high school graduation requirements at the local/state level.

**Elective Credit**: Credit hours awarded that count toward the total credits required for graduation but do not fulfill a specific general education, major, or minor requirement.

**Placement/Course Exemption**: Recognition of prior coursework that allows a student to skip introductory course sequences or enter at a more advanced level, without necessarily
